Insofar as we are undergoing major leadership and policy changes, issues of faculty governance are of paramount importance. Consequently, and to avoid conflict of interests, for purposes of faculty representation (e.g., task forces, committee membership) faculty should consistently be restricted to those whose responsibilities are scholarship, teaching (e.g., lecturers, librarians, clinical & tenure track faculty), and service, but not include individuals whose responsibilities are administrative (e.g., deans, chairs). The oversight of this resolution will be responsibility of the Committee on Faculty Participation in Governance.

XIV.	New Business	Governance Committee Resolution – A resolution that there are more faculty members without administrative duties placed on committees.
